It's that most wonderful time of year where we get to celebrate with family, friends and all of the good things we have in our lives.



# The Kindred Spirits of Jazz and Surgery

I know it sounds odd but bear with me while I explain myself and no, I don't cover why music is often played during surgical cases. That may be another submission.

When I held an administrative role in Toledo, I was asked to address a group of 250 members of the local chapter of the Association of Operating Room Nurses (AORN). I sent the chairperson a list of 5 topics to speak about to these 250 nurses, my beautiful wife being one of them (more pressure) and she selected: professionalism in the operating room. I proceeded to draft the presentation on specific characteristics of being a professional and the plan was to have actual examples of each of these characteristics to make the connection roles in an operating room.

This included characteristics such as integrity, wisdom, organization, dedication, and continued learning, among others. When I got to *focus*, I thought of one person: Claude Black. Claude was a jazz pianist from Detroit that I heard play on a weekly basis at Murphy's Place in downtown Toledo. In his career, Claude played with Stan Getz, Charlie Parker, Wes Montgomery, Sonny Stitt, Aretha Franklin and, for the last few decades of his life, with bassist Clifford Murphy. One night the trio was particularly good during their first set. The level and coordinating skills were absolutely spot-on and that resulted in both seamless precision and audible perfection.

At the break when Claude typically came over to the bar and took his normal place where Joannie set his dinner down for the night. He sat down with a "Good evening, Dean, it is good to see you again." and proceeded to dig in. During that conversation I said, "Man, you guys are on fire tonight!" to which with an affirmative nod he responded, "Yeah, we sound pretty good." Then I said, "Hey, Claude, knowing that most of us will never be able to experience it, what does it feel like to do one thing that well." You know he looked at me with those septuagenarian eyes and clearly said, "Dean, it's like breathing . . . I don't even know I'm doing it."

This 'unconscious knowing" comment set my mind racing and, in my research, found studies where musical training produces lasting improvements to a cognitive mechanism that helps individuals be more attentive and less likely to be distracted by irrelevant stimuli while performing demanding tasks. One specific study noted that the attentional system consists of three subsystems that are mediated by anatomically distinct neural networks: alerting, orienting, and executive control networks.

The alerting function is associated with maintaining states of readiness for action. The orienting function is linked to the selection of sensory information and change of attentional focus. The executive control function is involved both in the suppression of irrelevant, distracting stimuli and in top-down attentional control. The study's findings also demonstrated a correlation between the alerting and orienting networks in musicians than in non-musicians, possibly reflecting a functional relationship between these attentional networks derived from the deliberate practice of music or in my mind, the practice of surgery.

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

I hope you are now seeing the connection and why I included it in my presentation to those nurses. I have seen a similar 'concert' in many operating rooms across the country. high-performing surgical teams not only in their doing their jobs but doing their jobs with an awareness of their co-members in these performances. As with musicians, this comes first and foremost, from a desire to be good at what they do and that stems from a continuing education and purposeful practice. But, just like musician groups, the outstanding performances occur when there is a palpable awareness of the surroundings, an adaptation to the talent around the individual and an unselfish desire to recognize the performance of others.

This orchestration is truly something to witness, and I consider myself extremely fortunate to have done so often in my career. I would contend that it is *focus* like this that results in Claude's casual "it's like breathing" comment about creating great music. Likewise, surgical teams strive to go into that both complex and dynamic theatre that is an operating room and give the performance of their lives . . . every time.
